Parametric Tax Optimized ladder investment approach

Professionally managed, tax-optimized ladder fixed income bond portfolios may provide greater after-tax income and total return compared to single sector bond portfolios. This tax-optimized strategy allows for customized management with the benefits of institutional buying power, professional credit oversight, and ongoing tax loss harvesting.
